

Our final trip was to the Clarkesdale Bird Sanctuary where we needed to be fast with the cameras to capture various bush birds flitting around.















The current situation is a great time to think about working on getting new inspiration in your photography. The following ideas are some hints for looking outside the norm.

# Pick a theme

Deciding on one particular thing to focus on can help you improve a skill.

Theme ideas:

- Light backlighting, dramatic light, natural light, indoor light
- Composition framing, leading lines, golden spiral
- Street photography
- Macro even if you don't have a macro lens you can use macro filters

# Choose a subject

If you have children you may notice they are in 95% of your photos. Focus on a new subject to try new compositions and break out of your normal photography routine.

- Shoes
- FlagsWindows
- A color
- Lines
- Doors
- Chairs

# Go outside your comfort zone

Maybe you rock at portraits, try your hand at food photography. Try a different type of photography you are used to. Not only will you learn some new skills but it is fun to try something you aren't strong at.


# Focus on one lens


If you have multiple lenses choose one you don't normally use. Stick that one on your camera for a week, a month or a whole year. This will help push your creativity. I remember doing a photo walk with a photographer who took street photos with a macro. Don't assume a certain lens is only for one time of photos.

## **Different Levels**

Try taking photos at different heights. Step up on a chair and look down. Alternatively, crouch down and look up. Go out into the garden lie flat on your stomach and look through the viewfinder. See how the world looks from the perspective of a small bird or insect.

MAY
Places of Worship

#### **Definition**

An image of any building (inside or out) where people congregate for religious practices. People may be included but must not be the main subject of the image.

#### Additional Information

This has more to do with the architectural elements of the building or surrounds of a place of worship. The image must be unmistakably identifiable as a place of worship. Whilst items used in or as a part of religious ceremonies are permissible they must be incidental to the image and not form the main subject of the image.

JUNE Night Sky Photography

#### **Definition:**

An image taken after dusk including star trails, milky way or any celestial object. Can include stitched images.

#### **Additional Information:**

Mastering low light photography is the aim here. Whilst the main subject is what is happening in the night sky, light painting of foreground objects is permissible. Correct exposure and focus of the night sky and what it contains is a must. This includes the application of post processing in your photo processing

JULY Repetition

#### **Definition:**

An image that contains a repeating element in a way that creates interest, movement and/or harmony and unity.

#### Additional Information:

The repeating image may be naturally occurring or composed e.g. still life.
