What did you do during January ?

Following a couple of test messages between Jamie and I " wondering why we weren't out taking photos of the brilliant sunset during the recent extreme heat wave". It only took one of us to consider the lightening that had been present the previous evening and a text to say "I'm game if you are?" Jamie had the ideal spot in mind at Mount Hollowback. It just goes to show you need your cameras charge and ready at all times. Half an hour later saw us up the top of the mountain checking out the views over Ballarat as dusk settled. The lightening proved to be intermittent and moving back and forth between Ballarat and over Creswick way. With our camera firmly mounted on tripods, set on manual, cable releases in hand it was a waiting and a game of luck to capture the lightning strikes with a thirty second exposure. This proved to be the correct exposure time this was worked out by the failure rate at other exposure times. Some thirty two shots later I had four lightening strikes recorded and a lot of black photos. The rain saw us scuttle back to try safety of the four wheel drive and head for home. Jamie did comment on the good electric conductivity of the gate and the rain after he closed it on our way out. I was just pleased to be driving. The results, well you'll see these over the coming competition nights.



The next evening saw us out again and Trevor despite his sore back couldn't resist. So back up the mount we head for sunset shots. *Mmm*, not very inspiring and lacking foreground interest. So we stayed for star trail photography, remembering all the settings and adjustments you need to make on your camera as dusk settled In. Yes we started taking photos too early. I settled on the old method of leaving the camera shutter open for a thirty minute exposure but the ambient light from Ballarat over exposed this too much. I turned my attention to the telecommunication towers behind as foreground interest and focused on those using a torch. The results are pleasing enough but very noisy.

Next evening saw us out at Lake Learmonth, using the lake as foreground interest. You defiantly need a compass to determine magnetic south if you want circular star trails, either a phone app or a true compass like what we keep in the car glove box is ideal. A torch also is handy, especially a smaller torch for guiding yourself along dark tracks, although you need to be very careful where you point it. Guaranteed you will growl at if you don't. This time we all used the short exposures method and planned to stack our images in a freeware stacking program later on. Camera setting was as follows. Manual, lowest f stop possible f2.8, f4.5 and f5.6 lens were sigma 10-20 mm and a 28 a70 mm. Cameras were tripod mounted with cable releases attached. Lenses were set on the infinity settings. Test shot were taken at dusk to gauge exposure time and ISO settings of 400 chosen. The aim is to let in the maximum amount of light to show the stars without overexposing the image. We all opened our lenses, set the cable releases to take continuous thirty second exposures, crept off the landing jetty and sat down on the park bench and waited for one hour and ten minutes. A thermos of tea, apples and talk followed as we watched the cameras write images and the green lights flash on the back of the cameras. Make sure you turn your cable release off and let the camera create the thumbnails before turning your camera off. Otherwise would the images be written, I not sure. We were also entertained by the people coming and going to the caravan park. At 11 pm we called it guits and headed home. After loading starttraxs we exported our JPEG images from Lightroom into the program and watched it load and create the start trail Images. It reminded me of watching an image emerge from the emulsion in the darkroom, only less smelly. A pleasing result but we need more exposure time to obtain a greater circles of stars and more colours.

While the moon is still in the New moon quarter and not rising till 4 am the next trial will be a two hour exposure, some 240 images. At least while the weather is so hot it's pleasant to be outside at such an hour and we don't need to worry about condensation on the lenses and be freezing ourselves. A few nights later we ventured to the old Church at Blampied. A great place for all sorts of photography, especially moody foggy wintery mornings. There is plenty of space to spread out with due south being away from the roadside. The traffic proved to be problematic with a constant stream of cars till about 11pm. Keep a eye out for Jamie's masterpiece at club competition shortly.

Anyone wishing to join us is welcome if you are game enough, after all some change in conversation would be good.
